# 5. NATIONAL LANDCARE NETWORK

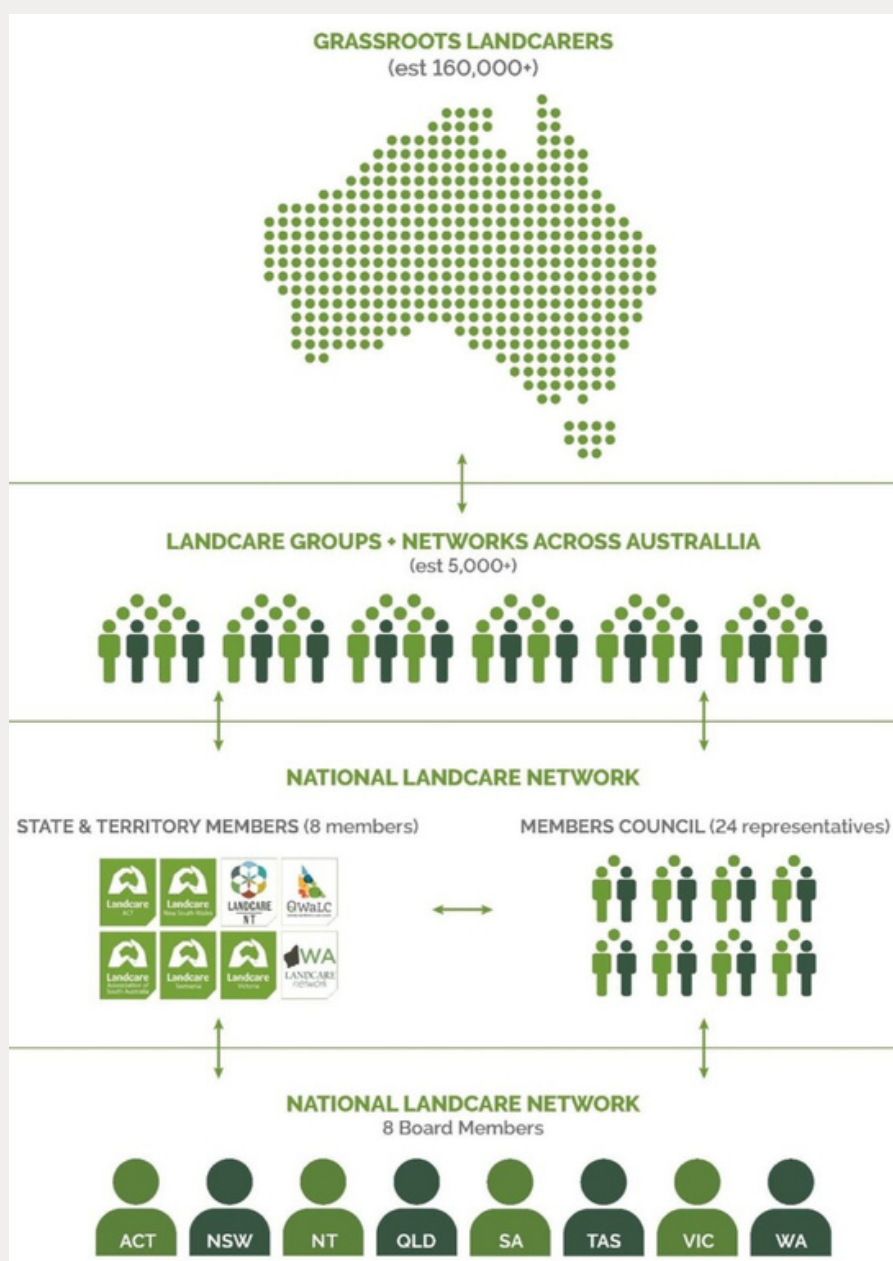


Figure 1. Organisational structure of the National Landcare Network showing how the voice of grassroots Landcarers is captured at the National level.

LASA is a member of the National Landcare Network (NLN) alongside the other Landcare peak bodies in each State and Territory (Figure 1). The NLN gives a voice for Community Landcare across the country.

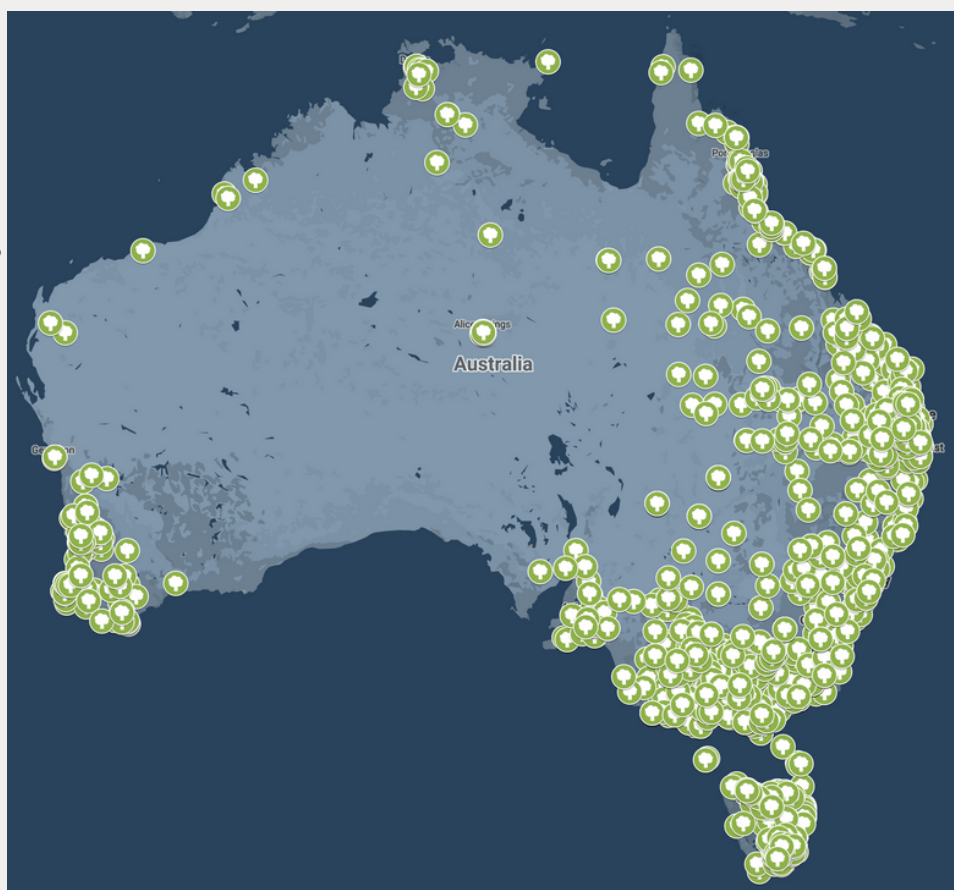


Figure 2. Map of the National Landcare Network showing over 2,000 active State and Territory Landcare Organisation members based on data provided in August 2022.

The Network has over 2,000 active State and Territory Landcare Organisation members representing 6,000-plus individual Landcare groups (Figure 2) and over 160,000 Landcarers across Australia. These groups feed into the representative nature of the NLN through the Members Council (Figure 1).

We would like to acknowledge the work of Gerry Butler, Natalie Somerville and Dr Eleanor Pratt who are members of the NLN Members Council and Dr Patrick O'Connor for his contribution as outgoing Chairperson on the NLN Board.

The change of Federal Government saw renewed interest in the capacity of community Landcare to deliver national resource management projects at scale and we look forward to working with the NLN and other STOs across the country to ensure we are best placed to tackle future disaster responses and deliver real action on the pressing climate and environmental challenges of our times.

## A Roadmap for the Future

This year, LASA was pleased to be able to co-design The Australian Community Landcare Futures Framework, delivered by the NLN.

If adopted, it would see a \$48 million investment over five years in addition to, and complementing, the existing Regional Land Partnership program.

The Framework is underpinned by three priority initiatives:

- Landcare Futures Community Investment Initiative,
- Landcare Futures Environmental Markets Leadership Initiative, and
- Landcare Futures Innovation Initiative.

## Working Together

This year LASA has enjoyed an unprecedented level of collaboration with other Landcare State and Territory Organisations (STOs), led by the NLN.

With increased organisational capacity, the NLN has facilitated a number of knowledge exchange and co-design workshops with the aim of representing the needs of community Landcarers across the country and elevating a united representative voice and vision for policy makers.

NLN facilitated workshops including:

- Regular STO C/EO Workshops,
- National STO Communications Forum,
- Future Framework co-design,
- National Environmental Science Program,
- Needs and capacity of the national network,
- Advocacy & Knowledge Sharing,
- Collaboration,
- State of the Environment Report 'Landcare; a beacon for hope', and
- Biodiversity Markets.

## 9. 2021/22 HIGHLIGHTS

### Landcare-led Bushfire Recovery Grants Program

The Landcare Association of SA (LASA) was a key delivery partner in the Landcare-led Bushfire Recovery Grants Program. This was a major collaboration between the National Landcare Network, Landcare Australia and the State and Territory peak bodies to roll out \$14 million of funding around the country under the Australian Government's Bushfire Recovery Program for Wildlife and their Habitat.

We funded and supported seven highly successful projects on Kangaroo Island aimed at protecting and monitoring unburnt areas and threatened native flora and fauna, managing pest species and building capacity in the Kangaroo Island community to continue recovery efforts. Major achievements of this program include the near complete eradication of feral pigs, the discovery of the thought to be extinct assassin spider in unburnt refugia, and the collaboration and support shown by the whole Kangaroo Island community.

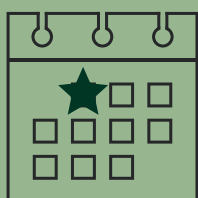

In 2022/23 we are swapping the biennial conference model for a series of smaller events to bring Landcare news and opportunities for agriculture, conservation and communities to locations across South Australia - The Landcare Roadshow. The Roadshow events have been designed to share information and exchange ideas, a key commitment in Landcare Association of South Australia's 2021 - 2025 Strategic Plan. Specifically, the strategic plan states our commitment to:

- Promote and share up-to-date scientific and cultural information relating to land restoration practices through community engagement activities, and
- Create opportunities for people to meet face to face to share knowledge, experiences and expertise about landscape restoration.

With multiple Landcare Roadshow events in the pipeline, we can't wait to bring them to a location near you.





## Care for Landcare

The Government of South Australia have committed \$1 million to LASA over the next four years, which will begin to be rolled out in 2022/23. This will help to boost capacity for Landcare groups and Landcarers around the state by:

- 1) Employing a State Landcare Coordinator to offer increased support to our members,
- 2) Offering grants to our members to help purchase materials and equipment, and
- 3) Ensuring all Landcare groups can access adequate insurance for their activities and members.

**NOTE 1: STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

This financial report is a special purpose financial report prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act 1985 (SA) and the ACNC Act 2012 (Div. 60 – Reporting).

The Members of the Board have determined that the Association is not a reporting entity.

#### Statement of Financial Position

- Cash at Bank is \$148,591.27
- Accounts Receivable \$49,500 is for two invoices to Landcare Australia which was paid in full on 27/09/2022 and 11/10/2022.
- Total Assets are \$198,091.27
- Accounts Payable of \$7,018.58 consist of superannuation \$1,754.59 and wages tax of \$5,264 for the June 2022 quarter which has been paid.
- Payables - Other consists of prepaid memberships of \$970.93.
- GST clearing of \$13,729.49, comprises \$4,500 GST on Accounts Receivable which will be included in the 2022/23 Annual GST return (due to GST being accounted for on a cash basis) and the Annual GST Return amount for 2021/22 which was paid on 17/10/2022.
- Total Liabilities are \$21,719.00
- Net Assets total of \$176,372.27 equates to the aggregate balance of all of the active jobs appearing on the Jobs list report.

#### Profit/Loss Statement

##### Income:

- Total income for the 2021/22 financial year is \$198,851.06.

- In 2020/21 Project Management expenses of \$85,000 to employ the LASA Executive Officer including vehicle expenses, travel and operating budget, plus payroll, admin and management services were provided by GWLAP. In 2021/22 Berri Barmera Landcare was contracted to provide financial services which are allocated to Accounting Fees.
- A Motor Vehicle was leased in August 2021.
- Rent expenses totalling \$7,146.13 was paid in 2021/22.

- Overall, a net surplus of \$48,822.42 for the financial year.
